David A. Greisiger passed away unexpectedly on Tuesday, January 10, 2012 at the age of 78.

He was born in Toledo on October 10, 1933, the son of the late Joseph and Marie (Nagge) Greisiger. In 1951, Dave graduated from the former Olney High School, now known as Northwood High School, where he was an accomplished athlete playing baseball and earning both conference and state titles in basketball and track. He went onto earn his Bachelor's of Science Degree in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Toledo. During his 55 plus year career, Dave held various managerial and engineering positions in Ohio, Michigan and Pennsylvania for MOCO Thermal Industries, KTG Glassworks Technology, Toledo Engineering Co., A.C. Ledbetter & Son and Surface Combustion. In 1989, he joined D Booth & Company which eventually became BW Services where Dave currently holds the title of Owner and Vice President. He also completed continuing education classes in Business Management and Glass Technology and earned several certificates from various company sponsored schools.

Dave was an active and devout Jehovah's Witness for over 70 years, baptized in 1942. He spent much of his time learning and sharing the Good News of the Kingdom, even serving at the World Headquarters in his early years. He loved to spend time with his sister and brother-in-law, Mitch, sons and grandchildren. He enjoyed watching sports and tinkering around doing projects.

Dave will be greatly missed by his twin sister, Dana Joan (Mitch) Ulbick; sons, David (Kathy) Greisiger of Toledo, Jeffrey Greisiger of Coral Gables, FL, Michael Greisiger of Columbus, OH and Aaron (Jacki) Greisiger of Maumee, OH; grandchildren and step-grandchildren, Shawn, Kendall, Braiden, Zachary, Samuel, Chloe, Cahle, Jadynd and many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents and his brothers Robert and Joseph.
